The **RSPCA** :Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals; was the first organisation dedicated to the well-(*done /exists / being*)of animals anywhere in the world. In England and Wales alone, the RSPCA employ more than three hundred inspectors (*which /whose /that*) job it is to investigate reported cruelty to animals. 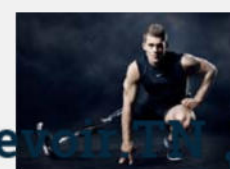
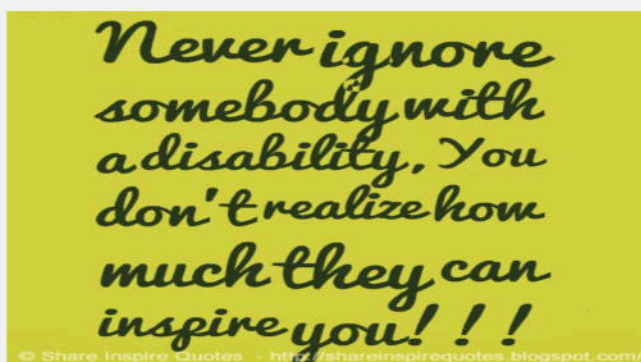
