3- Maria's sister, Anna who also enrolled in virtual school, has a different take on the experience. While Maria was taking her geography test, the 13-year old Anna sat in the family's living room. She was also "at school," with her laptop opened to an online math lesson. "I hate it," she said about going to school online. "It was different for my sister because none of the girls were really nice to her, but I never had that problem. All my best friends are at school." Anna transferred to Minnesota Virtual High School from Hermantown Middle School this year after her parents bought her a horse; the deal was, if she got the horse, she had to take care of it. The flexibility of the online schedule allows her to do that. But Anna said she misses her friends, extracurricular activities and the structure of traditional school.

4- "It's harder for me to concentrate like this," she said. "I'll be doing an assignment and I'll want to go on Facebook to do something else. Plus, it's all reading, and I hate reading. I like to be shown what to do instead of having to read what to do." She also said teachers aren't always as helpful when they are not instructing you in person.

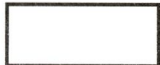
